



Sanctuary Nomination Process (SNP)



The Road to Nomination

- Community develops a sanctuary nomination, submits to NOAA
- Within NOAA, ONMS reviews to determine if nomination materials are complete and responsive to the 11 SNP criteria
- If so, add nomination to eventory of sites that could potentially be considered for designation one day
- If NOAA has not initiated a designation process within five years, then ONMS reviews that nomination – where we are now
- If NOAA were to initiate a designation process, it is a totally separate public process involving extensive consultations are ross 2-3 years


When submitted: July 17, 2015

When added to inventory: October 5, 2015



Purpose: NCTC identified 9 goals for the sanctuary all oriented around the broader purpose of creating and conserving a thriving ecosystem, which in turn can: safeguard the area's coastal and marine resources; open new opportunities for research; enhance economic growth including fishing and recreational activities. Achieving these goals relies on managing through input from a local sanctuary advisory council and through NOAA's comprehensive ecosystem-based management philosophy for sanctuaries.

Proposed Chumash Heritage National Marine Sanctuary



Purpose of Five-Year Review



- Ensure NOAA has a full awareness of the issues and opportunities facing any nominated area within the inventory
- Ensure that nominations in the inventory continue to be relevant and responsive to the four national significance criteria and seven management considerations: i.e., 11 SNP criteria
- Provides an opportunity to the nominators, public, stakeholders and partners to submit relevant and responsive information from 2015 until now to update a nomination



Process for Five-Year Review



- ONMS seeks information responsive to the 11 SNP criteria
- Receiving input for the Chumash Heritage nomination from:
 - Nominator: Northern Chumash Tribal Council
 - Government agencies
 - Members of public, stakeholders
- Input will aid ONMS staff review of continued relevance of nomination
- Input not responsive to the 11 SNP criteria will not aid that review
- Can also submit written comments at:
 - Federal eRulemaking Portal: www.regulations.gov.
 - Use docket number NOAA-NOS-2020-0063.

Next Steps



- Review the information received through written and spoken comments
- Independently, gather information relevant and responsive to the criteria
- Compile, synthesize and assess the information to determine if the nomination is still accurate and relevant
- Produce a synopsis report with analysis and recommendation for maintaining or removing the nomination in the inventory
- Anticipate decision by end of September or early October, 2020





SNP Criteria: Four National Significance



- 1. The area's natural resources and ecological qualities are of special significance and contribute to: biological productivity or diversity; maintenance or enhancement of ecosystem structure and function; maintenance of ecologically or commercially important species or species assemblages; maintenance or enhancement of critical habitat, representative biogeographic assemblages, or both; or maintenance or enhancement of connectivity to other ecologically significant resources.
- 2. The area contains submerged maritime heritage resources of special historical, cultural, or archaeological significance, that: individually or collectively are consistent with the criteria of eligibility for listing on the National Register of Historic Places; have met or which would meet the criteria for designation as a National Historic Landmark; or have special or sacred meaning to the indigenous people of the region or nation.
- 3. The area supports present and potential economic uses, such as: tourism; commercial and recreational fishing; subsistence and traditional uses; diving; and other recreational uses that depend on conservation and management of the area's resources.
- 4. The publically-derived benefits of the area, such as aesthetic value, public recreation, and access to places depend on conservation and management of the area's resources.

SNP Criteria: Seven Management Considerations






- 1. The area provides or enhances opportunities for research in marine science, including marine archaeology.
- 2. The area provides or enhances opportunities for education, including the understanding and appreciation of the marine and Great Lakes environments.
- 3. Adverse impacts from current or future uses and activities threaten the area's significance, values, qualities, and resources.
- 4. A national marine sanctuary would provide unique conservation and management value for this area or adjacent areas.
- 5. The existing regulatory and management authorities for the area could be supplemented or complemented to meet the conservation and management goals for the area.
- 6. There are commitments or possible commitments for partnerships opportunities such as cost sharing, office space, exhibit space, vessel time, or other collaborations to aid conservation or management programs for the area.
- 7. There is community-based support for the nomination expressed by a broad range of interests, such as: individuals or locally-based groups (e.g., friends of group, chamber of commerce); local, tribal, state, or national elected officials; or topic-based stakeholder groups, at the local, regional or national level (e.g., a local chapter of an environmental organization, a regionally-based fishing group, a national-level recreation or tourism organization, academia or science-based group, or an industry association).

NOAA Requesting Information Responsive to the 11 SNP Criteria



- Submit comments that are relevant and responsive to the 11 SNP criteria.
 Examples include:
 - New information from the last five years about the natural and cultural resources of the area
 - Changes (increases or decreases) in the threats to the resources originally proposed for protection
 - Changes to the management frameworks in the area
 - New commitment of partnership opportunities such as cost sharing or exhibit space
- Comments that are not relevant and responsive to the 11 SNP criteria for the fiveyear review are not really useful to NOAA
- Comments on whether or not to initiate a CHNMS designation is not relevant
